The Mustang was introduced at the New York World Fair in April of 1964.

It was aimed at young people and quickly became a very hot item with Ford Motor Company selling thousands of them.



But where, besides in the US, were there a lot of young Americans that would love a sporty Mustang? Well, there were a lot of young, American, potential customers in West Germany. Yes, there were a lot of American GIs stationed in West Germany at the time because of the Cold War.



So, Ford developed a plan to help soldiers buy Mustangs. After the soldier's tour of duty was over the government would ship the car back to the states free of charge. There was only one problem. A German truck maker, Friedrich Krupp AG Hoesch-Krupp, owned the rights to the name. For \$10,000 Ford could have bought the rights to the name but they refused. Instead, Ford called the Mustang the T-5. Ford removed

all Mustang lettering from the car and substituted the T-5 name. Some other small modifications were also made to make the car legal to drive in Germany.

Ford continued to produce T-5 cars for the German market until 1973, when the truck company let the copyright on the Mustang name to expire. After that the German cars were called Mustangs.



Antique Autos in History Park

The largest annual antique auto show in the West "A Living History Day"

Join us for the largest annual antique auto show in the West.

The 23rd annual Antique Autos in History Park presented by the Santa Clara Valley Model T Ford Club and History San José will take place on Saturday, September 9, 2023, from 11:00 AM to 4:00 PM. This event fills History Park (Kelley Park, 693 Phelan Ave, San José, CA) with 200 period-correct pre-1946 vehicles, fire equipment, bicycles, and motorcycles of all makes.

Requirements for entering an antique vehicle.

There is no registration required to enter a vehicle. Just bring your antique vehicle to the <u>gate at History Park</u>. All vehicles permitted on the grounds of History Park, from 11:00 AM to 4:00 PM, were manufactured between the late 1800s and 1945 and are period-correct. No vehicle will be allowed on the grounds of History Park during the show that is newer than 1945.

The featured vehicles this year are 1916 to 1930 Orphan Autos.

Also located on the grounds will be the Early Day Gas Engine and Tractor Association. There will be antique crafts demonstrated and antique collectibles displayed. A Dixieland Jazz Band will provide music, songs will be sung by The Fabulous JewelTones, and dancing by the San Francisco Bay Area Vintage Dancers. See toy trains operated, take a trolley ride and see blacksmith demonstrations. Food will be available from food trucks and ice cream from O'Brien's Cafe. Activities are provided for kids.

Please note there is NO alcohol, NO pets (except service dogs), and NO BBQs allowed inside the park. These are Park rules and must be followed.
