Former Club Member Marie Cavalli past away January 16th. Here is a write-up of her life.

Marie lived a wonderful life. She was born on May 22nd, 1914 on her family's dairy ranch in Pomponio, CA. She was the youngest of five-

At age 4, Marie started her education at the one-room schoolhouse down the road because they needed more students to keep it open. She walked to school through fields of fava beans that towered over her, frightened of the snakes in her path. She liked school and wanted to be a teacher from the very beginning.

Marie went to Pescadero High School and met the love of her life on the school bus when she was a sophomore. He was the handsome new transfer student from Sequoia High School, Milton.

Their first encounter did not go well. Each morning, Milton, who was picked up first, would sprawl across the front seats of the bus. Marie was last to be picked up. When she looked for a seat on the crowded bus, Milton refused to move over to give her a seat. She thought he was a rude bully.

Then, a few months into her sophomore year, Marie's sister-in-law threw a Valentine's Day party for her and her classmates. Milton arrived in his best outfit and enthusiastically participated in the games. Marie was impressed when he was willing to push a peanut across the floor with his nose to win a relay race.

They started dating soon after that party, beginning an 83-year romance. After a long engagement, they were married for 76 years. They loved to travel, dance (ballroom and square dance...Marie made all the costumes) play tennis, spend a part of every week at their cabin in La Honda relaxing...but mostly working, and going on car trips with the car clubs.

Marie was the only one in her family to go to college. She got a cosmetology license from College of San Mateo and a BA and teaching credential from San Jose State University. She taught for 36 years, first in the one-room schoolhouse that she had attended in Pomponio, where she served as teacher, principal, and janitor. She even had to purify the water and keep the wood stove heater stoked.

During WWII, Marie taught in San Leandro and rode a bicycle (purchased with rations) to and from school. She quickly learned that it was safest and most practical to wear pants, rather than the long skirts that were considered proper attire for a teacher at the time. But she wore her pants anyway, clear in her convictions that practicality was more important than propriety in this case.

Starting in 1946, Marie taught at Beresford Park School in San Mateo. She provided an enriching experience for her students: taking them on field trips, publishing their stories and poems in the local newspapers and planning large-scale art projects. Two permanent clay pieces made by her students were installed on the school grounds—an obelisk that stood at the entrance to the school and a clay mural depicting California history on the entrance wall.

In 1944, Marie's daughter Kristeen was born. Since Marie worked as a teacher throughout Kris' childhood, summers were their opportunity to spend quality time together. Marie and Kris would spend the summer months in La Honda, swimming in the pool, playing canasta, and rehearsing for weekly dance recitals, performed for friends and neighbors in the outdoor Play Bowl every Saturday.

In 1963, Marie and Kris took a three month tour of Europe. She asked Milton to come along, but he declined. After two months, he missed her and Kris so much that he bought a ticket and joined them. For Marie and Milton, that was the first of many travels throughout the US and abroad.

In 1975 she retired from teaching when her granddaughter Shaleece was born. In 1979 her grandson, Brent, was born. She loved being a grandmother and was excited to pass on her love of nature to her grandkids.

In her retirement, Marie loved to play tennis. She won some trophies at her local club and played until she was 93. She learned to use the computer, wrote her autobiography and enjoyed writing poetry.

Marie and Milton had a very active social life and many friends. They especially loved adventuring with their car clubs. On one particularly exciting trip to Yosemite, a wheel on their Model T Ford came loose on a windy, narrow road on the side of a cliff. The others in the Model T caravan helped wire the wheel together and they continued on their adventure.

Milton died at 102 in 2015 and Marie went to live in Becky and Vito's care home and there she was cared for by the wonderful Liza Magbiray. When the care home closed two years later, Marie and Liza moved to an apartment complex where they quickly grew close to their neighbors, building close and lasting friendships. Every day, Marie loved watching and hearing the children play. Milton's best friend, Bill and his wife Pat visited them every Sunday. Liza and Marie lived there until Marie had a beautiful and peaceful passing on January 16, 2022.
